Favorite Flora: Leucaena retusa - Goldenball Leadtree - By Jon Marenfeld



Well the heat is on. We knew it was coming but at least May was a welcome change from the norm. With the increase in temperatures comes the need for a good shade tree. One tree that's a good courtyard or patio tree is Leucaena retusa, commonly known as the Goldenball Leadtree. Native to southwest Texas and the northern Chihuahaun Desert it's a semi-evergreen vase shaped tree that casts filtered shade and produces sweet-smelling bright yellow puff-ball flowers from spring through fall. The Goldenball Leadtree is very drought tolerant, can handle reflected heat, has cinnamon-colored flaky bark, and reaches up to 20 feet tall and 15 feet wide. It can be grown as a single or multi-trunk tree.

One thing to consider is that the wood can be a bit brittle so some branches could snap in high winds so plant it where it could get some protection. Plant the Leucaena retusa in well-drained soils and in full sun for the best results. Once established supplemental irrigation is only needed during the hottest and driest parts of the year. The only care the Goldenball Leadtree needs is picking up the leaves when it goes cold dormant, the seed pods it drops, and any twigs that may snap off. Because it's a great choice for xeriscaping pair it with boulders and other xeriscape plants such as Yucca elata (Soaptree Yucca), Dasylirion wheeleri (Desert Spoon), Opuntia sp. (Prickly Pear Cactus), Ocotillo, barrel cactus, and agave.
